

HOW FLUID IS YOUR STRATEGY?

Yet their strategy did not match their mission once the terrain changed to video streaming and downloads.

As leaders it is our job to keep our eyes on the ever changing terrain we are encountering and react quickly enough to adjust our strategy and tactics accordingly. It is also our job to communicate those changes so clearly that our teams can make the necessary adjustments without missing a beat. How fluid is your strategy?
